

### CLIMATE SMART COMMUNITY TASK FORCE



The Village Climate Smart Community Task Force (CSCTF) was established by the Village Board of Trustees in 2016 to consider initiatives that may be suitable for Kinderhook under the Climate Smart Community (CSC) program sponsored by New York State Department of Environmental Protection. The program's purpose is to provide local governments with guidance on how to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, save tax dollars and advance community goals for health and safety, economic development, energy independence and quality of life.

The CSCTF is an advisory group of resident volunteers and Village Trustees. Our broad focus has two main objectives:

- 1. Providing educational events and regular communications that offer practical ideas and information to community members on what each of us can do to preserve and improve our environment.
- 2. Working with the Village Board to foster environmentally sound policy and actions

### Some examples of these efforts are:

- The Village was designated as a NYSERDA Clean Energy Community (CEC) in 2019 after completing four action items. Completion of these items resulted in grants totaling more than \$50,000 to be used for energy efficiency and greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction projects. In 2021, NYSERDA initiated a CEC Leadership round from which we hope to receive additional funding for sustainability projects in the Village. Currently, we are projecting the completion of action items that can earn the Village an additional \$15,000 in grants from NYSERDA. We have completed five items thus far and recently initiated another, a Community Solar Campaign. We are also working on achieving bronze certification in the Climate Smart Communities program by compiling data regarding the Village's ongoing sustainability efforts.
- In the first half of 2021 alone, the Village's electric vehicle charging station (EVCS) usage accounted for a reduction of more than 1.8 metric tons of GHG. Since its installation in 2019, usage of our EVCS has resulted in an estimated 3.4 metric ton reduction in GHG emissions.
- A continuing collaboration with the Kinderhook Memorial Library (KML) and local community groups and businesses to increase environmental awareness in our community. Working with the KML, Samascott's Market Center and Hannaford, we held a second Meatless Monday initiative in the Village in June 2021. There were 76 household sign ups with 156 participants in this year's six week event, a reduction of about 3.1 metric tons of GHG emissions. Hannaford and Samascott's donated gift cards and the Friends of the Library donated vegetarian cookbooks to be awarded to a number of participants. The CSCTF obtained and donated a garden composter to the Library as first step in establishing a composting educational program in the Village.
- We continue to publish updates of our activities and achievements on the Village website and in the biannual Village bulletin. We also regularly post environmental information and tips on sustainability on local social media outlets like Nextdoor Kinderhook and IMBY.
- During the Village Board meetings and budget workshops, we continue to advocate for including energy saving and sustainability considerations in their decision making. We continue to work with the Board on converting Village street lighting to energy saving LED fixtures.
- Solar installations on two municipal buildings are expected to begin before year end. Additionally, the rest of the Village's municipal electrical needs is to be supplied by a community solar farm in early 2022.
- We continue to work with the Village Board to include the Village as a 100% green energy member in the Capital Region Community Choice Aggregation program in 2021, along with twelve other municipalities including the Towns of New Scotland, Bethlehem, Guilderland, Niskayuna Villages of Voorheesville and Altamont the Cities of Albany, Schenectady, Troy, Saratoga Springs, Watervliet and Glens Falls.

Thanks to the ongoing support of the Village Mayor and Trustees, the Task Force volunteers will continue to look into additional actions that will promote sustainability and lead to the Village being designated a **Certified Climate Smart Community**. With that certification, the Village will have additional opportunities for grants from New York State for future environmental projects.

The Task Force meets regularly on the second Tuesday of the month at 7PM. Those interested in the Climate Smart Community program can check the Village website's calendar for the dates, times and locations of future meetings.

### **Did You Know?**

The photo of the house featured on the front page of this newsletter is known as the Burgoyne House. On the evening of October 22, 1777, General John Burgoyne was held in this house as both a prisoner of war and a guest, while being taken from the Battle of Saratoga to Boston. Burgoyne is best known for his role in the American Revolutionary War. He designed an invasion scheme and was appointed to command a force moving south from Canada to split away New England and end the rebellion. Burgoyne advanced from Canada but his slow movement allowed the Americans to concentrate their forces. Instead of coming to his aid according to the overall plan, the British Army in New York City moved south to capture Philadelphia. Burgoyne fought <a href="two small battles">two small battles</a> near Saratoga but was surrounded by American forces and, with no relief in sight, surrendered his entire army of 6,200 men on October 17, 1777. This landmark is now a private residence, and no tours are allowed.

## STREET REPAIRS

Of interest to many residents in the Village of Kinderhook, is what is happening relative to Street Repairs. Why did Eichybush Road and Hudson Street recently get re-surfaced and not Albany Avenue and/or Williams Street? Here are some answers from inside your local government, as follows:

- The Village had adequate funding, bid documentation, and a contractor ready to proceed with the re-surfacing of Eichybush Road and Hudson Street. A decision was made June 9<sup>th</sup> at the Village Board Meeting to proceed with this work effort.
- It is understood that both Albany Avenue and Williams Street are in more need of upgrades and repairs, however, there are steps not yet completed that need to be addressed and resolved prior to proceeding with this work effort.
  - Engineering drawings previously produced need to be updated before requests for bids can be issued and contractors selected to perform the work efforts.
  - Albany Avenue and Williams Street upgrades and repairs will require substantially more funding than the resurfacing of Eichybush Road and Hudson Street because we need to concurrently replace the water main lines underneath both roadways as well as replace the sidewalks. As such, these Projects will require additional federal and state funding and a bond referendum or public hearing before this work can proceed. There is another grant opportunity opening this fall in which the village will apply for.
  - The Village has received \$57,406.48 via the federal Affordable Care Act (the second half of these funds is to be received next summer, 2022) and federal Infrastructure funding for roads and water system improvements has not yet been passed by Congress and the President. It is hoped that this will happen soon and that our portion can be determined by summers end. Thereafter, the Village can determine how much bonding to request.
  - In the meantime, due to the treacherous conditions on Albany Avenue with standing rainwater and potholes, we are considering the possibility of re-surfacing a portion of Albany Avenue this summer. This will help with the water runoff and provide temporary relief while we obtain the funding required to completely improve the roadway and replace the water main line.

Project status is reported at Village Board Meetings on the second Wednesday each month.



THE SENIORS CORNER



According to a 2016 study in *JAMA: The Journal of the American Medical Association*, approximately one in three people between the ages of 65 and 74 has hearing loss. Only 20% of adults who need hearing aids actually use them. Price is the most common roadblock: The devices can cost thousands of dollars each, and most seniors need two of them. But there are ways to get help with those costs.

While original Medicare (i.e., Parts A and B) does not cover hearing aids or the exams required to fit them, some Medicare Advantage plans do, so talk to your insurance provider. In some states, Medicaid will also pay for hearing aids.

Lions Clubs across the U.S. offer the Affordable Hearing Aid Project, which helps seniors with limited incomes access hearing aids that they would otherwise be unable to afford. The program also arranges for the fitting and follow-up care. The Lions Clubs also takes donations of used hearing aids. Each club has its own income guidelines for determining who qualifies, so check around.

The National Hearing Aid Project supplies hearing aids to low-income U.S. residents who lack insurance coverage for the devices. Qualified individuals receive a hearing assessment, a fitting, and a follow-up. Those who receive hearing aids through the program are asked to share their story on a personal fundraising page in order to encourage others to donate to the program.

Help America Hear provides hearing aids to financially challenged Americans who have exhausted all other resources. Qualified recipients pay anywhere from \$125 to \$375 per hearing aid, depending on income level. The hearing assessment is not covered.

The Miracle-Ear Foundation is another possible source of hearing aids for seniors who have significantly limited financial resources. The program has a nonrefundable application fee of \$150; if you are accepted, there are no further costs.

Another option is to contact hearing aid manufacturers to ask about participating in a clinical trial. Trial participants generally get to keep the products they test.

## K.I.S.S PROGRAM KEEPING THE IDENTITIES OF SENIORS SAFE

Even a partial account number, coupled with the name of your bank, or other information can be matched with any other info that's been gleaned to open accounts in your name. That's why it's important to shred mail or other documents containing potentially sensitive information.

Businesses are picking up the pace, as Kinderhook celebrates the opening of three New Businesses and Re-Openings, with construction and renovations for other Village businesses nearing the finish line.

• Gallery Northeast, featuring regional contemporary Impressionist painters, is now open at 12 Broad Street. Exhibitions will change every four to six weeks.

- Julia Jayne Pilates at 28 Hudson Street is now open for private and small classes by appointment online.

- The School Jack Shainman Gallery has reopened to the public with its newest exhibition, "Feedback," and extended open hours every **Saturday 11am-6pm**.
